

Course Name: School and Community

Course Number: SOC* 261

Credits: 3 credit hours

Catalog description: A guided field experience for students entering the fields of teaching, psychology, sociology, social welfare, child care, law enforcement urban technology, health care services, and other areas of community development. Based on the individual student's needs and career objectives, the course provides the opportunity for volunteer work in schools and community agencies under the guidance of college faculty and agency professionals. Most of the semester will be spent in the community placements. Students will keep a journal. The class will meet as a seminar only a few times to share experiences, resources, ideas, and to discuss the relevance of the readings to the community service.

Course Content:

- 2. Direct Held placement where students volunteer in schools or community service organizations.
- 3. Journals and other assignments, and periodic seminars, which serve to integrate the field placement experience with sociological analysis.
