Course Content:

Materials and Tools

- A. Printing Grounds: (optional) metal, plastic, wood, glass, found objects
- B. Printing paper
- C. Tools appropriate to grounds: gauge, chisel, burin, roller, etc.

Printing Process

- A. Intaglio- incised line
- B. Relief- negative space cut away
- C. Monoprints and other experimental techniques

Pulling Prints

- A. Hand Printing
- B. Mechanical Press

Generating original design and adapting it to printmaking process

- A. Determine theme
- B. Consider appropriate printmaking technique

- D. Consider the fact that the print is a mirror image of the original design
